



What to Know for scheduling COVID-19 Vaccine Appointments

If...	Then...
You are currently eligible to receive the vaccine per DHS guidelines:	Appointments are based on vaccine supply. If you are interested in getting a COVID-19 Vaccine please call: 608-662-4914. COVID-19 scheduling line is open, Monday - Friday 8AM - 4PM
You will be traveling for a significant amount of time (i.e. moving to a winter home out of State):	You should make sure you will be in town for the first and second dose of the vaccine. Second doses are given around 28 days after the first dose. Both doses must be received from the same health care provider.
You are allergic to an ingredient in the COVID-19 vaccine, which includes: – Polyethylene glycol – Polysorbate – Polyoxyl 35 castor oil	You should schedule a Video Visit via GHC MyChart with your Primary Care Provider to talk through shared decision making.
You received an immunization other than the COVID-19 vaccine in the last 2 weeks, or plan to receive an immunization after first or second dose of the COVID-19 vaccine:	COVID-19 vaccines can be co-administered with other routine vaccines.
You have had an allergic reaction to the first dose of the vaccine:	It is okay to proceed with receiving your second dose, but you will be required to wait 30 minutes after the vaccine is administered. If you are unsure if you want to receive your second dose, schedule a Video Visit with your Primary Care Provider to talk through shared decision making.
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If...	Then...
You received monoclonal antibody therapy or convalescent plasma as part of their treatment for a past COVID-19 infection:	Your vaccine should be scheduled at least 90 days after treatment.
You have a fever or other symptoms of an active infection:	Your vaccine appointment should be canceled, and you should contact your Primary Care Provider regarding testing or other care needs.
You are allergic to another “injectable” medication or have had a prior reaction to an injection that did not contain the same ingredients as the COVID-19 vaccine:	Schedule a Video Visit via GHC MyChart with your Primary Care Provider to talk through shared decision making.
You have had anaphylactic reactions in the past and do not know what caused them:	Schedule a Video Visit via GHC MyChart with your Primary Care Provider to talk through shared decision making.
You are on allergen immunotherapy:	The COVID 19 Task Force does not anticipate any contraindication. However, it is recommended that the two shots are given more than 48 hours apart to avoid confusion, should a reaction occur.
You have already received the COVID-19 vaccine and are questioning if you have built up immunity:	The CDC advises against antibody testing in vaccinated patients to assess for immunity to SARS-CoV-2. The antibody test results would be uninterpretable and could lead to either false concern or false reassurance. Patients should review the vaccine efficacy data available on the CDC webpage.
